





Introduction to the Lesson Plan

The aim of this lesson plan is to support you, as a community and adult educator, to deliver a session using the FARCE Climate Change Awareness — Compendium of Comedy and Learning resources, with adult learners in your group. Through this lesson plan, we will provide you with some sample activities that you can use to deliver one of the Comedy Resources from this Compendium in a group-work setting. When preparing to deliver these activities in your group, it is important that you are prepared to use the Comedy for Climate Change resources. For this, we recommend that you complete the relevant modules from our FARCE In-service Training Programme, before delivering these activities in your practice.

Introduction to the Climate Change topic The Museum

This Audio resource is set in a museum where the guide is explaining one of the exhibits, the remains on the Hine Hukatere Glacier.

She tells the story of Hine Hukatere (The tears of Hine Hukatere). The story that gave the glacier its name is kind of a tragic love story, Hine Hukatere who lost her true love in an avalanche while climbing in the mountains of Westland. New Zealand. Hine Hukatere was extremely strong and fearless and loved climbing in the mountains. She persuaded her lover Wawe to climb with her. Wawe was less experienced in the mountains but wanted to follow her.

An avalanche hit the lovers as they were climbing, and Wawe was swept from the peaks to his death. Hine Hukatere was heart-broken and her grief caused her to cry rivers of tears, which flowed down the mountain and were frozen by the gods. Her frozen tears stay as a reminder of her grief and give the glacier its name - Kā Roimata ō Hine Hukatere (The tears of Hine Hukatere).

Franz Josef Glacier (given name) is a 12-kilometre-long temperate maritime glacier in Westland Tai Poutini National Park on the West Coast of New Zealand's South Island.

Together with the Fox Glacier 20 kilometres to the south, and a third glacier, it descends from the Southern Alps to less than 300 metres above sea level.

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Getting to know the Resources

In this section, we will provide you with a brief introduction to the Comedy Resource that you will use in when delivering this lesson plan in a group of adult learners.

What is covered in the Comedy Resource?

This Comedy Resource is intended to highlight issues of global warming and the possibility of the loss of our glaciers.

The guide is frustrated by the lack of understanding and the cynicism of her group and fails to convince them with disastrous results for the exhibits.

Links to facilitate study some of the issues in more depth are provided as well as links to some of the related comedy resources available on the FARCE site.

The lesson plan can easily be adapted if not much time is available.

Applying this Comedy Resource

The story is one the participants are not likely to be familiar with but the speaker uses this reiterating parts of the tale to introduce aspects of the issue of global warming as she tells the story.

The lesson plan offers suggestions of resources that can be used. The tutor can choose whatever is appropriate for the level of understanding and the mood of the group
